




Swimming Team


The Burris swimming team, coached by Robert Korsgaard, brought honor and prestige to the school with one of its most successful seasons to date. The outstanding performances of the team were due to its remarkable balance; there were strong swimmers in every event. The Owls finished their season with an 11-4 record, losing only to a strong Columbus team twice, and to New Albany twice. The team went on to finish second in its own Invitational. The greatest thrill of the season came when the tankmen placed second in the State Meet at Purdue. The Columbus team, which was rated second in the nation during the season, was the only team that placed above Burris in the Invitational and the State.

In the State Championship meet, junior Miley placed 3rd in the 50-yd. free style. Phil Brown, a junior diver, also placed 3rd, in his event. The Moffitte brothers, Ted and Tom, both placed in their respective events, with Tom finishing 6th in the 400-yd. free style and Ted placing 5th in the 100-yd. backstroke, even though he was plagued by an acute leg injury. Senior Lary Schulhof, an All-American in his event, placed 1st in the 100-yd. butterfly for the third straight year. The 200-yd. medlay relay team consisting of Ted Moffitte, Davis, Schulhof, and Slavin, finished 2nd, and the 200-yd. free style relay team, composed of Voran, Legg, Stafford, and Miley, placed 3rd.


Lary Schulhof, who was undefeated all season long in the 100 - yard butterfly, brought special acclaim to himself and Burris by breaking the national interscholastic record in this event. His time of :54.7 bettered the old record by almost 3 seconds. Schulhof and six other seniors will be lost by graduation, but this year's underclassmen turned out such fine performances that prospects for next year are very good.







SWIMMING TEAM

The 1960-61 Owl swimming team, coached by Robert Korsgaard, enjoyed another good season. The team was a mixture of outstanding seniors and promising underclassmen.

The Owls splashed through their regular season with only two losses to Columbus blemishing their record. They won the Kokomo Invitational, placed 2nd (to Columbus) in the Burris Invitational, and placed 4th in the State meet.

In the State meet, the Owls were led by five seniors. Jim Miley placed 2nd in the 50-yard freestyle and anchored the 200-yard freestyle relay team which also placed 2nd. Ted Moffitte placed 3rd in the 100-yard backstroke and set a new school record in that event. Ted was also a member of the freestyle relay team. Ted's twin brother, Tom, placed 5th in the 400-yard freestyle and also 4th in the 200-yard individual medley. Phil Brown received 6th place in the diving and Rudy Stafford a 6th place in the 200-yard freestyle along with being a member of the freestyle relay squad. The 4th member of the relay team and also the only non-senior to score in the state meet was Jim Devoe.

Although the team will be hard hit by the graduation of the hardworking seniors, a fine upcoming group of juniors and sophomores give promise of more successful teams in the future.



Ted Moffitte 200 yd. freestyle relay 100 yd. backstroke 1:03.9






Jim Miley 50 yd. freestyle :24.0 200 yd. freestyle relay





SWIMMING TEAM

The 1961-62 Burris tankmen, under the capable direction of Coach Robert Korsgaard, came splashing through with a regular season record of five wins and six losses. They also won a three-way meet, placed eighth in the Burris Invitational and captured fifteenth in the State meet. The Owls were hit extremely hard by graduation, but with the aid of some experienced seniors and up-and-coming underclassmen, the Burris team gave a good account of itself.

Seniors Phil Davis, in the 100-yard breast stroke, and Bill Marsh, in diving competition, consistently placed well for Burris. Outstanding leadership was provided by juniors Andy Garling, individual medley and 100-yard butterfly, Ronnie Martin, 100-yard backstroke, and Larry Clock, 400-yard freestyle. The freestyle relay team, consisting of Dan Casey, Bruce Jones, Bill Michael, and Larry Clock, chalked up several victories in regular season competition. The medley relay team of Ronnie Martin, Phil Davis, Mike Sherry, and Ronnie Peters, also added to the team's scoring power throughout the season. The powerful medley relay team of Martin, Davis, Garling, and Clock placed sixth in the State meet.

Next year should bring much improvement in the Owls' swimming team, with many promising underclassmen coming up. The team and Coach Korsgaard deserve congratulations for a fine season.







The 1963 swimming team under the capable leadership of Robert Korsgaard ended the regular season with eight victories and only three losses. This team, one of the strongest aggregates in the school's history, broke eight of eleven school records: Clock in the 400-yard freestyle; Garling in the breaststroke; Martin in the backstroke; Casey in both the 100- and 200-yard freestyle; the freestyle relay team composed of Winters, Michael, Caldemeyer, and Casey; and the medley relay team of Martin, Garling, Sherry, and Casey.

The Owls placed third in the Burris Invitational and forth in the sectional, thereby qualifying four individuals and both relay teams for the state meet. In the state meet Burris placed ninth. The powerful medley relay team placed third, and backstroker Ron Martin placed sixth. First year diver Steve Dixon was among the top ten in the state. An unfortunate disqualification on a turn eliminated Andy Garling, who had the third best time of the breaststrokers in the state.





Junior Allan Caldemeyer, 100 Freestyle record holder










1966: 6-7; Coach Bob Gordon Arrives

MR. ROBERT GORDON coached the swimming team to a very successful season. Swimming against some of the state's best teams, their total record was a respectable six wins and seven loses.


