

Local swimmers improve on seeds at state meet

INDIANAPOLIS - Delaware County's representatives in the THSAA state swim meet failed to score a team point, but several individuals and both relay teams fared better than expected.

Preliminaries were held Friday with the finals Saturday at the Indiana University Natatorium.
