Central is among favorites in Richmond swim sectional

Central joins perennial state powers Anderson and Richmond as the favorites in the Richmond boys swimming sectional this weekend.

The Richmond Sectional is an 11team meet that also includes Yorktown, Anderson Highland, Anderson Madison Heights, Centerville, Connersville, Hagerstown and New Castle

The preliminaries in the swimming events begin at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Saturday, preliminaries in the diving begin at 9 a.m., with consolations and finals in all events set for 2:30 p.m.

Central is 11-1 in duals, with its only loss coming by three points to Richmond earlier in the year. Despite that, Central Coach Bob Chico compared the swimming sectional to the boys basketball sectional, in that it's a new season.

"Yo go into the preliminaries on Thursday, and you've got to really swim tough to qualify for Saturday. Saturday is the only chance to qualify for the state meet, so nothing else really matters up to that point in the season," Chico said.

The Bearcats' best chances stand with senior Walker Marsh, who has been under the state qualifying time in the 100 butterfly and the 100 breaststroke often this year.

Also challenging the state qualifying times are junior Greg Sissel in the butterfly. Adam Fero in the freestyles and senior John Marshall in the breastroke.

The 200 medley relay team of

Samuels has also been under the state cut, and Sissel, Samuels, Mike Tucker and Fero challenge that time in the 400 freestyle relay.

"We're concentrating on getting good swims in the preliminaries." Chico said. "We've had some sickness. If we're healthy, and swim well, we'll be in good shape for the finals.

Southside Coach John Phillips said the Rebels have been swimming well.

"We've had some real, real close losses this year," he said. "The times are to the point now that the kids see maybe they could have reversed some of those losses. At the beginning of the year, I told them realistically I wanted to win 12.

Southside is 10-7, and Phillips holds no delusions of grandeur about a tough sectional.

"We can't compete with Central, now that the Northside kids are there, or Anderson or Richmond. We're hoping to get a sixth-place finish," Phillips said.

Southside's best shot in advancing to the state meet is in senior Eric Ross, who swims the 50 and 100 freestyles. Phillips said his chances are best in the 100.

Other top swimmers for the Rebels include seniors Roman Pickering in the backstrokes, Jeff Collins in the individual medley and Scott Fritz in the freestyles.

Fritz and Ross in the freestyle sprints should be Southside's top point scorers, Phillips said.

Delta is one of the three top

Marsh, Marshall, Sissel and Pat teams in the South Adams Sectional. Coach Tom Devine said Fort Wayne Snider and Norwell are the other top teams.

The South Adams Sectional will be competed on the same schedule as the Richmond Sectional.

The 9-3 Eagles are led by senior Doug Souffrant, who is seeded first in the 100 breastroke and second in the 200 medley relay.

The Eagles' medley relay team of Todd Case. Souffrant. John Rinker and Ed Dowd is also seeded first, but Devine said they are separated from the other top teams by just hundredths of a second.

Junior Mike Brady is the third seed in diving, and Devine said he has a good chance of going to the state meet.



in the freestyle relay. Central's time was 3:19.06.

The only other local qualifiers were from Delta. Doug Souffrant placed 19th in the 100 breaststroke in 1:02.74, and Mike Brady was to compete today in the preliminaries of the diving competition.

Jason Arnold of Jay County qualified fourth in the 50 freestyle in :21.79 and sixth in the 100 freestyle in :47.66. Teammate Chad McClung was also scheduled to participate in today's diving.

Central swimmers 10th at state meet

All six Central High School swimmers who qualified for the IHSAA state meet scored points as the Bearcats finished 10th in the overall standings.

Anderson won the team title with 181 points in the two-day competition that concluded Saturday in the Indiana University

Natatorium on the IUPUI campus in Indianapolis.

Bloomington South was runnerup with 160 points, followed by Kokomo 155, Munster 154, Carmel 147, Columbus North 118, Indianapolis North Central 98, Richmond 84, Lake Central 831/2 and Central 81.

Central senior Walker Marsh was third in the 100-yard butterfly in a school-record time of 52.02 seconds. That time qualified Marsh for the United States Swimming Junior Championships in Pensacola, Fla., in late March.

Marsh placed seventh in the 100 backstroke in :54.20, also a

school record.

Central's 200 medley relay team placed sixth in a schoolrecord 1:38.83. Marsh was on that team along with John Marshall, Greg Sissel and Pat Samuels.

Central sophomore Adam Fero earned points by placing 12th in the 100 freestyle in a school-record :47.96 and finishing 13th in the 200 freestyle in 1:46.60.

Sissel was 14th in the 100 butterfly in :54.55, and Marshall

placed 14th in the 100 breaststroke in 1:01.85.

Central's 400 freestyle relay team of Fero, Mike Tucker, Sissel and Samuels placed 11th in the school-record time of 3:18.15.

The 10th-place team finish was the best in the coaching career of Bob Chico, who was in his first year as Central coach after many years as Northside coach. His best finish at Northside was 12th.
