under adverse conditions.


If that is the case, Central should be in pretty good shape when the Richmond Sectional finals take place at 2 p.m. Saturday in Tiano

# Central swimmers finish s

RICHMOND, Ind. — Muncie Central held a 31/2-point lead going into the final event of the IHSAA boys' swimming and diving sectional at Richmond Saturday, but the four Bearcat relay swimmers couldn't keep up with Anderson.

It all came down to a swim off between Anderson, Richmond and Muncie Central. A difference of 3.21 seconds in the 400-yard freestyle relay — Anderson winning and Muncie Central finishing third decided the overall winners of the sectional.

"I thought it would go down to the last relay, and it did." Central coach Bob Chico said.

Anderson and Muncie Central had swimmers advance in six and three events, respectively. Richmond qualified one swimmer for the state meet.

Muncie Central will send four swimmers - Gordon Heck, Adam Cairns, Mike Pinger, Richard Ellison in the 200 medley relay, and Heck in the backstroke - to the state and divers Ryan Fillmann and Casey Stanton to the regional.

"It will be good to get some com-petition before state," said Fillmann, the defending state champion. "There's no one at state I haven't beat yet, so I'm pretty optimistic going into it."

The diving regional will be held Tuesday at Kokomo, with the state meet at the IUPUI Natatorium on Friday and Saturday.

# Central, Delta place second in sectionals

Central and Delta each surpassed expectations to earn close runner-up finishes Saturday in IHSAA sectional swim meets.

At Richmond, Central lost out to No. 20 Anderson in a bid for its second consecutive team championship. The Indians scored 252 points and the Bearcats 247.

"I think we did a very good job and we lost to a very good opponent," Central Coach Bob Chico said

Delta's five-year hold over the Jay County Sectional ended, but not without a fight. Favored Norwell managed a narrow 231-230 victory over the Eagles for the



win - which we didn't - but we gave it a heck of a run.'

The local area will send four individuals and four relay teams to this weekend's state meet at the Natatorium in Indianapolis

In addition, divers Ryan Fill-mann and Casey Staton of Central and Jason Peterson of Jay County advanced to regional competition Tuesday in Kokomo.



state," Chico said. "We're aware of what he must do to score well down there.

"I think he'll do OK. Whatever happens, we know he'll give it his best shot. He sure is competitive."

The local area sends four individuals and relay teams to the 59th championships beginning Friday evening. The swimming and diving finals are 1:30 p.m. Saturday.

Central's other representatives are its 200-yard medley relay team and Gordon Heck in the 100 backstroke. Relay members are Heck, Adam Cairns, Anthony Ellison and Michael Pinger.

Ellison is the only relay member without previous state meet experience.

Delta will send its 400 freestyle relay team, Casey Mumaw in the 200 and 500 freestyles, and Andy Wallace in the 100 freestyle. Mumaw and Wallace will participate in the relay, along with Jeremy Dann and Justin Grider.

Jay County advanced 200 medley and 200 freestyle relay teams and Brian Weaver in the 50 freestyle.

Weaver, Joe Wright and Greg Fisher swim in both relays. Jeremy Klingel completes the medley team and Brian Miller the freestyle relay.

Looking at Fillmann's main rivals, sophomore Elliot Massuda of Valparaiso had the highest regional diving score with 464.70

Also bettering Fillmann were sophomore Aaron Kirkpatrick of Pendleton Heights (424.40); senior Rusty Swickheimer of Franklin Central (421.70); and sophomore Dylan Nichols of Pike (418.30).

While Fillmann seeks a state title, the local swimmers try to meet personal goals.

Heck, seeded 16th, wants the Central school record in the 100 backstroke. Walker Marsh holds it with a 54.19-second swim in the 1989 state meet and Heck's lowest performance has been a :54.98:

Central's medley relay is seeded 25th and Chico figures a two-second drop from their 1:43.17 last week could earn them a spot in the finals.

Wallace is closing on Delta's school record of :48.4 in the 100 freestyle. He clocked :50.13 in winning last Saturday's Jay County sectional meet.

Delta Coach Tom Devine said Wallace actually was under the record during his relay split at sectionals.

Mumaw has qualified in the freestyle races the past two years and wants to drop his time under two and five minutes in the races.

"He has a chance to have some good time drops there, and hopefully squeak into the scoring, Devine said.

Delta's 400 relay was timed at 3:26.76 at sectional, and the team wants to eclipse the school record of 3:20.00.

# Getting things done



# Central diver does what he has to do to be the best

ar staff reporter Ryan Fillmann will prove on Saturday he is still No. I in the state when it comes to high school diving.

At least he thinks so, and so does one of his top competitors.

"He'll probably win again," Pendleton Heights diver Aaron Kirkpatrick said of Fillmann. "When he has good competition, he doesn't miss a dive

A junior at Central High School, Fillmann started diving when he was 12 years old. Before that he had wanted to be a gymnast, but two broken bones later, he redirected

T broke my arm twice in gymnastics and had a lot of injuries, so my parents said I

should try diving," Fillmann said.

His injuries turned out to be a great example of how things can work out for the best. Fillmann's diving career highlights include winning first place at the North Central Conference, sectional and regional competitions this year.

He also broke a North Central Confer-ence record set in 1970 and Delta High School's pool record this season. And he has broken every diving record at Central.

In 1993, Fillmann won the state Junior Olympics competition and placed in the top 20 at the national level.

That kind of success comes only with talent and practice.

"You don't meet too many people like him," said Dennis Sunderman, an athletic trainer at Central. "He knows what he has to do to be the best. A lot of times that means practicing two times a day."

At night, Fillmann often visualizes his dives and watches videos of professional divers. That mental preparation is crucial for diving in crowded natatoriums.

As he stands on the board and prepares to dive, Fillmann blocks out all distractions.

"I just think about my dive and what I'm going to do, and I usually do it," he said.

Fillmann is mentally tough outside of diving, as well.

"He's a pretty hard worker," said Tanner Snell, who has been Fillmann's friend since seventh grade. "He usually gets things done that need to be done."

At school, Fillmann catches onto concepts effortlessly, said his journalism teacher, Terry Nelson.

"He is quick-witted," Nelson said. "He's fun to be around. He's very, very sharp. He learns quickly, but yet he doesn't appear to be overly scholarly or overly serious about anything he does."

When he's not diving, Fillmann enjoys just hanging out with his friends, playing billiards or going to basketball games. After the season is over, he stays active outdoors with cycling, hiking and baseball.

"When we hang out, we don't get into big conversations about [diving]," said Ryan Tolle, who has been Fillmann's friend for 14 years.

Lately, Fillmann hasn't had much time to hang out with his friends.

"When I'm not diving, I'm usually too tired to do anything," he said.

He has been working on a cou-

ple new dives, but they won't be in his program Saturday. His prepared dives will range in difficulty from 2.4 to 3.0, with 3.0 being the highest degree of difficulty.

"I really don't need to add any new dives to be competitive," he said.

Fillmann should have some competition Saturday at the Indiana University Natatorium in Indianapolis, where he will compete against 31 of the state's top divers.

Kirkpatrick, of Pendleton Heights, scored 424.4 at the Crawfordsville Regional; Fillmann won the Kokomo Regional with 417.75 his lowest score in more than 2 years. Three other divers also scored higher than Fillmann at regionals.

But Fillmann is not worried. Last year, he was ranked seventh going into the state competition, where he took first place.

"I had a good meet at regionals, but the judging was real low," he said.

Fillmann has competed against
— and beaten — all of the other
regional winners in previous competitions.

"I'm happy some divers have higher scores than me," Fillmann said. "It kind of gives them confidence."

Confidence is not something Fillmann lacks.

"If you don't know Ryan, he appears to be self-contained or conceited," Nelson said. "But when you get to know him, he's sure of himself because he's a tremendous diver."

His swimming coach, Bob Chico, calls Fillmann's attitude optimistic.

"He approaches it from an optimistic point of view that he can perform just about any dive in the program," Chico said.

One thing you can bet on is when the pressure is high, Fillmann will perform his best.

"I've never beaten him before," Kirkpatrick said. "I've come close, / but he's always pulled it off."

# Central's Heck, relay advance to consolations

Central junior Gordon Heck reached the consolation finals of the 100-yard backstroke and the 200-yard medley relay with teammates Michael Pinger, Anthony Ellison and Adam Cairns at Friday night's IHSAA swim meet in Indianapolis.

Heck placed 15th in the backstroke preliminaries with a lifetime best time of 54.94 seconds.

The medley relay also placed 15th in qualifications, although the Bearcats won their heat in 1:40.49. They were in the slow first heat, however.

Consolations will be this afternoon in the Natatorium.

Diving preliminaries were to start at 9 a.m. today, with Centraljunior Ryan Fillmann competing. Fillmann is the defending state champion.

No other local swimmers or divers advanced to today's competition.

Delta senior Andy Wallace swam :49.75 in the 100 freestyle to better his sectional time by almost one-half season, but he placed 30th.

In the 400 freestyle relay, Wallace, Jeremy Dann, Justin Grider and Marc Geelhoed placed 31st in 3:28.14.

Mumaw finished 29th in the 200 freestyle in 1:51.07 and 29th in the 500 freestyle in 5:04.26.

Jay County's Brian Weaver took 31st in the 50 freestyle in :22.78.

The Patriots also placed 30th in the 200 freestyle relay in 1:33.16 and 28th in the 200 medley relay in 1:45.11.

# Fillmann second in finals

INDIANAPOLIS - All it takes is one dive to ruin state championship

Muncie Central's Ryan Fillmann had one of those fateful dives, And it probably cost him his second consecutive state title.



Pike's Dylan Nichols won the state diving 434.05 score. Despite that one bad dive, Fillmann had a lot to say as to who would be the champion.

Fillmann, the defending champion, hit

his seventh dive short at the state diving meet Saturday, landing him a score of 25.0.

That low score, combined with a 48.0 performance on the next dive by longtime leader Rusty Swickheimer of Franklin Central, appeared to knock Fillmann out of the 1996 state championship race.

But, by virtue of a 51-point dive by Fillmann in the 10th round, the Bearcat junior climbed back into the hunt, only to be caught from behind by the next-to-last diver.

"He put pressure on the other two [leaders]," Central diving coach Tanya Wingfield said

"It came down to whoever had the best dive in the last round."

Going into the seventh round, Fillmann was in third place, although he trailed then-first-place diver Nichols by only 4.85 points and Swickheimer by a mere four-10ths of a point.

Then trouble hit for Fillmann. His seventh dive, a reverse 1½ somersault in the pike position, ran into problems. The dive was well short, with Fillmann barely avoiding the board

Fillmann lost 13,4 points on Nichols and 12.8 points on Swickheimer in the seventh round, giving Fillmann a major gap to

That gap became almost insurmountable in the eighth round, as Swickheimer nailed a dive that gave him 48 more points. Meanwhile, Fillmann scored 36.9 points in the eighth on a forward 1½ somersault twist, putting the Bearcat junior even farther behind.

But turnabout is fair play in the diving world.

In the 10th round, Fillmann nailed an inward 1½-pike, posting a score of 51.60 on the dive. That put him within earshot of Swickheimer and ahead of Nichols for the final

"That was the same dive that won it last year," Wingfield said. "We set up his dives so he would always be in position to catch up.

Then Swickheimer opened the door for Fillmann with a 21.3-point dive that fell short of completion. Fillmann then attempted one of

the most difficult dives in high school competition: a reverse 21/2 tuck with a 3.0 degree of difficulty. He had a chance to blow the meet wide open, but a poor takeoff held Fillmann to a 39-point score. It was good enough to pass Swickheimer, but all Nichols needed to win was

Nichols nailed his last dive, giving him a score of 47.5 and the state title.

"All we really needed was one more point from all the judges," Central head coach Bob Chico "Two of Ryan's last three dives were excellent. They put him back in contention."

In other swimming events, the Bearcat 200-yard medley relay team of Gordon Heck, Adam Cairns, Anthony Ellison and Mike Pinger placed 15th overall with a time of 1:41.01 in the consolation

Heck also competed in the consolution finals of the 100-yard backstroke, where he placed 15th overall with a time of :54.44 sec-onds. He improved his time by half a second over his preliminary showing.
