Delta, Yorktown qualify swimmers for state finals

FISHERS, Ind. — Host Hamilton Southeastern was the class of the field Saturday in the boys' swim sectionals, but Delta and Yorktown weren't far behind.

Sixth-ranked Hamilton South-eastern won with 358 points. Fiftcenth-ranked Delta was second with 262, and Yorktown was third with 182.

Muncle Central was sixth with 119, Muncie South eighth with 51 and Burris, with only two swimmers, 10th with 27

Delta qualified at least one individual and two relay teams for the state finals. Yorktown qualified one relay team.

"In some places, honestly, we hoped to do better," Delta coach Tim Brannock said.

Delta's Patrick Bird won the 50 and 100 freestyle events to qualify for state. His time in the 50 was 22.32, and his time in the 100 was 48.06.

Bird also was on two relay teams that qualified for state.

"I'm very happy for him," Bran-nock said, "He's a very deserving

Delta's 200 freestyle relay team of Ben Penrod, Erlk Conatser, Bird and Ryan Bowman finished second in a school record 1:29.17. The Eagles' 400 freestyle relay feam of Todd Wallace, Robert Šebura, Bird and Bowman finished second with a school record 3.18.91

In the 200 freestyle, Bowman set a school record with a time of 1:45.82, good for a second-place

Jägen Arnöld finished ninth, setting a school freshman record with a time of 51.44 in the 100

Yorktown's 200 freestyle relay team finished third but qualified for the state based on its 1:30.06 time, a school record. Relay members were Mark Finch, Kyle Ruth, Andy Clevenger and Charlie Sursa.

Clevenger finished fourth in the 100 butterfly with a school record 54.87.

"We set a lot of personal records on Thursday in the preliminaries. and we turned around [Saturday] and did better, Yorktown coach Jay Ettl said.

Ettl was particularly pleased with the state-qualifying relay team. Thursday was the first time each member had bettered the 23-second mark; and the team Improved Saturday,

Burris's Kitchie Caudill was second in the 100 breaststroke and third in the 200 IM.

Central's top finisher was Evan Whitte, who had two thirds.

Brannock is hopeful that Bow-man will be added to the list of state qualifiers in the 200 freestyle and 100 butterfly, where he fintshed third in 53.96.

Yorktown's Brady Edwards finished third in diving with 327.6 points and qualified for Tuesday's Oak Hill regional.

Host Jay County finished second in its sectional. Norwell won with 296 points, and the Patriots were second with 195. Blackford

was eighth with 45 points. Freshman Derek Arnold had the highest individual placing for the Patriots. He finished second in the 100 breaststroke. Freshman Kyle Weaver was third in the 200 IM, and freshman Caleb Bye was third in diving with 3:55.20 points. Bye qualified for Tuesday's diving regional at Oak Hill.

Two of Jay County's relay teams finished second.

12 ECI swimmers set for state meet

INDIANAPOLIS — Three East Central Indiana swimmers will be doing as expected today, competing in the state finals at the Indiana University Natatorium. Two New Castle swimmers made sure they had company.

Yorktown's Andy Clevenger and Delta's Patrick Bird and Ryan Bowman are making return trips to the state finals, which begin with preliminaries tonight at 6. New Castle's Aaron Ray and Jared Crabtree will make their individual state final debuts. They swam on a relay team 2 years ago at the state finals.

Bird and Bowman are both returning to the state finals after a year's absence. Bird and Bowman each made the state finals as freshmen then had to sit out their sophomore seasons, because they transferred to Della.

Bird is the highest seeded individual in an event from East Central Indiana. He is seeded 10th in the 100 freestyle. Bird also is seeded 28th in the 50 freestyle. Bird swam in the 100 at the state finals his freshman season. Bowman is seeded 15th in the 200 freestyle and 17th in the 100 butterfly. Bowman placed eighth in the 200 freestyle and fourth in the 500 freestyle at the state finals as a freshman.

Dird and Bowman also will

swim in two relay events for Delfa. They will team up with Beni Penrod and Eric Conatser in the 200 freestyle relay. The Eagles' relay team is seeded ninth. Delta's 400 freestyle relay team with Bird. Bowman, Todd Wallace and Robert Schura is seeded 16th.

Dird and Dowman's sectional times might be deceiving. Delta coach Tim Brannock expects their individual times to improve and for their faster times to improve the relay teams.

"We had intentionally not rested and shaved them for his sectional figuring they would swim faster at state." Brannock said. "We certainly hope to improve our times."

Ray, like Bird and Bowman, will swim in two events. He qualified in the 200 freestyle and 100 freestyle. Ray is a longshot in both events. He is seeded 28th in the 200 and 31st in the 100.

Ray's teammate Crabtree will swim the 100 backstroke. Crabtree has a better chance than Ray of placing in the top eight based on seeding. He is seeded 15th in the backstroke. Crabtree won the event at the Richmond sectional with a time of 54.70.

New Castle coach Jennifer. Kelsik is optimistic both of her swimmers can place.

"We think Aaron can go high 47 [seconds]," she said. "With another week of rest, I think he could go that, and that could get him in the top 16. If [Jared] drops another second, he could stay in top 16, and if he drops 2 seconds he could place top eight. They have a chance just like everyone else does."

Andy Clevenger, The Star Press boys' swimmer of the year last season, returns to the state finals in the 100 butterfly. He is seeded 27th. He placed fifth in his heat in the fly at last year's state final.

"I think Andy's ready for it," Yorktown coach Jay Ettl said, "He went a 54 at sectional and that was his fastest. I personally think he's got a 52 or 53 in him. We're pretty focused right now. I think he has a chance to move up."

Clevenger also will swim with Mark Finch, Kyle Ruth and Charlie Sursa in the 200 freestyle relay. The Yorktown relay team is seeded 15th. Ettl thinks the positioning of the relay team will help improve their time,-

"We broke the state cup times by a second," Ettl sald, "We have Delta on one side of us and Richmond on the other, and if they can't make us swim faster I don't know who can."

Bird and Bowman were part of two Delta relay teams that reached the consolations. The 200 freestyle relay team, with Ben Penrod and Eric Conalser Joining Bird and Bowman, had a time of 1:28.94 and qualified 11th. The 400 freestyle team of Bird, Bowman, Todd Wallace and Robert Schura had a time of 3:17.14 and also quallfled 11th.

"All of the times were school records," Delta coach Tim Brannock said. "That's what we were hoping for-We still feel there's a little bit left for Itodayl.

Yorktown's 200 freestyle relay team of Andy Clevenger, Mark Finch, Kyle Ruth and Charlie Sursa had the 18thfastest time and will be an alternate for the consolations. The Tigers' relay team finished with a time of 1:30.55.

New Castle's Aaron Ray and Jared Crabires, didn't make the consola-tions or finals in their individuals events nor did Yorktown's Clevenger in the 100 butterfly.

freestyle in 1:42.87, good for ninth. He was also part of Della's


