

The switch to the fly didn't guarantee Mitsch her spot in the state finals, however.

After making the change, she began focusing more of her practice efforts on the butterfly—swimming additional butterfly yardage in Saturday practices while continuing to swim the 200 freestyle in competition.

She entered the sectional as the No. 5 seed in the butterfly and swam the lifth-fastest time in the preliminaries to qualify for the finals.

In the finals, she blistered her previous best time in the event with a 1:02:68. The time was more than 1.5 seconds faster than her swim in the preliminar les fust 2 days earlier.



Yorktown looking up to HSE at sectionals

 When Yorktown swimming coach Jay Agnew measured his team's chances last year against perennial swim-ming power Hamilton Southeastern in the sectional championship, he said he thought the Tigers were "eyeball to eyeball" with the Royals.

This year, he said it's a little more like "eyeball to shoulder."

"Hamilton Southeastern is tough, there is no question about that," Agnew said. "They are loaded with speed and talent."

Yorktown, Central, Delta and Southside are four of the 11 schools competing in the Hamilton Southeastern Sectional, which begins with the swimming preliminaries today.

The sectional championship continues on Saturday with the swimming finals and consolations and the diving finals.

Agnew said the goal for his team is to steal a few races from the Royals, the second-ranked team in the state.

"The first thing you have to do is to bring as many swimmers as you can from Thursday to Saturday," Agnew said. "Then the hope is to get as many swimmers as you can through to the state finals.

The top six swimmers in each event in today's preliminaries advance to the finals; the next six swimmers qualify for the consolation.

On Saurday, the individual sectional champion earns a spot in the state finals, along with my swimmer who reaches the state standard time in the event.

But Delta coach Penny Wright said the teams and swimmers have to try not to worry about that.

You have to keep your focus on yourself, you can't control anything else, Wright said. "The hope is to get them into the individual and relay finals."

Hall defends 50 free title

Yorktown junior just misses record as Tigers finish seventh at state

INDIANAPOLIS — Kelsi Hall's excitement at the 1H-SAA girls swimming and diving state championship had a tinge of disappointment.

The Yorktown junior dominated her competition in the so-yard freestyle to capture her second consecutive IH-SAA state title on Saturday at the IU Natatorium. But in her battle against history and the clock, Hall came up short — two one-hundredths of a second ahort.

Hall clocked in at 22.92 seconds in the 50 free, just shy of the state meet record of 22.90 set in 1908 by Noblesville's Lacey Boutwell.

"Coming so close to the state record and not getting it is a little disappointing," said Hall, who tied for first in the 50 free last season. "But it's on her last season. But it's still really great to win a sec-ond state championship." Led by Hall's individual state title, Yorktown finished

seventh in the team standings with 114 points. Central picked up two points and was 51 st.


