Bemis highlights long season


The girls swim team sent another swimmer to state for the fourth straight season. This year it was junior diver Kris Bemis. Bemis was unable to advance to the finals but placed well.

After all was over and points totaled Bemis finished with an impressive standing of 31st.


Another individual mark was an 11th place sectional finish by freshman Holly Costill.

Reflecting back on the season Coach Becky Dietrich remarked, "The participation in the sport has improved greatly here at Central over the years."












"There were many personal bests achieved throughout this year. They had a great sectional and good state times," said Allardt.
