

The Schulhof Award

Lary Schulhof, former Muncie Burris swimmer, began his rise to swimming fame in 1957 swimming for Coach Korsgaard as a freshman where he finished third place in the 150 yard individual medley. In 1958 he won the first 100 yard butterfly state championship in a 58.8. 1959 saw Lary repeat in the fly with a new state record, 56.7, and state runner-up in the 150 IM. In 1960 he won the butterfly for third time in another state record time of 54.7 which also established a national record. Lary also swam on the medley relay team that was state runner-up for the Owls in 1960.

Lary decided to continue his education at Indiana University, where he trained under legendary coach Doc (James) Councilman. Lary was All-American and all Big Ten four times. At the 1962 NCAA Championships, Lary earned a 5<sup>th</sup> place finish in the 100 butterfly and a 4<sup>th</sup> place finish in the 200 butterfly. However, that same year, he won the National USA Championship 200 butterfly. During his senior season, at the 1963 NCAA Championships, he finished 4<sup>th</sup> the 100 butterfly and 5<sup>th</sup> in the 200 yard butterfly.

After Lary completed his senior year with the Hoosiers, he decided to continue training for the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. At the Olympic Trials, he qualified to compete in the 400 meter freestyle relay. That relay received the Gold medal at those games. Lary received his A.B. and M.D. degrees from Indiana University, where he completed more than six years of postgraduate neurosurgical training, including a year of pediatric neurosurgery training at Riley Children's Hospital and a fellowship in Cambridge, England. He studied micro-neurosurgery in Zurich, Switzerland and in Gainesville, Florida. Dr. Schulhof specializes in spinal surgery. He currently resides in Asheville, North Carolina.

In 1965, the city of Muncie and the Schulhof family began honoring the dedication and commitment of swimmers with an annual award to swimmers in Delaware County. The recipients are nominated by their coaches and one parent, who are appointed by the coaches. The criterion for this award is setting an excellent example in leadership, volunteerism and commitment to the swimming community. The award is presented during the Muncie Mayor's Meet (a variety of names has occurred with this meet—Delaware County Meet, Jaycees, etc..) held at historic Tuhey park pool. The award was not presented from 1980-1983 and 2009-2011 due to budgetary constraints, issues with the pool and a brief withdrawal of support by the Muncie mayor's office in 2010, this meet was not held in Muncie or was outright cancelled. It resumed in the summer of 2012 in a very new and improved 50 meter Tuhey pool.







Jaycee Swim Meet Is Set


Joe Allardt, chairman, of the hifth annual Jaycee • Delaware County Swim Meet, announced today that the meet will be held July 17 and 18 at Tuhey Pool.

Allardt pointed out that this event, which annually attracts almost 300 participants, will be <u>held a month</u> earlier than in past years.

He explained: "We have felt for several years that mid-August was too late to hold the swim meet, but have had difficulty moving the date forward because of the transition period within our club caused by the July 1 administration change. This year we set a precedent when our current Board of Directors approved the project on the recommendation of the incoming officers, so we are able to get an earlier start and hold the meet when the swimming should be at its peak."

# Darter Wins Schulof Trophy at County Meet

Alice Darter won the Schulof Trophy as the outstanding swimmer at the 1976 Muncle Jaycces Delaware County Swim Meet held Saturday at Tuhey Pool.

The award, given in honor of Muncie Olympic swimmer Lary Schulof, was given to Miss Darter on the strength of three fine first place finishes in her 13-14 age bracket, which gave her a total of 21 points. The Schu-iof Trophy has maintained a fine tradition in award winners as last year's recipient, Greg Beyri, was also the state champ in the backstroke.

Six other tankers managed three firsts and 21 points for their day's work before a very sizeable crowd of parents and interested spectators. Andy Tharp was the boy's age group winner for the 13-14 brackel with his

trio of wins. Also attracting three winning times were Dorice Kelly and Rob Culin, the boys and girls trophy win ners for the 15-17 age group. Kris Peterson of the girls' 11-12 group was the final female triple win-

ner and she was the age group trophy winner. Tony Brower and Steve Moore were triple winners as well as age group champs in the 11-12 and 9-14 groups respectively.

Amy Brown carried off the girls' 9 to frophy with her two firsts and a second, but a tie for the girls' 8 and under trophy developed when both Wendy Caron and Julie Curry nabbed two first place finishes and a second place medal aplece. Doug Coers col-lected the boys' trophy for the same age group with two gold medals and another silver disc.

With preliminary heats held in the morning, only the top six times for each event in each category Were allowed to compete for the medals and the second six best, times were placed in the "B" category to compete for ribbons in each event from each group
